MEET THE TRAINERS.

Continuing our series on meeting our trainers, this month we introduce a trainer who really needs no introduction!

DARRELL HATCH

Since he joined Forest Computer Pals in 1997, Darrell has been a star performer, cheerfully undertaking tasks when others have shrunk back. He has built, painted, or repaired furniture around the office, organised the Annual helpers' dinner (With Margot's aid recently and many others in the days when we held it in the Memorial Hall), organised Seniors' Week events, served as a trainer, still runs the introductory Saturday morning session for newcomers, serves on the committee and most importantly, is the Training Coordinator. We would be in deep trouble without this obliging man. So we met up with him recently and asked him a few questions about himself. Here are our questions and his answers.

Q. What enticed you to go to sea?

I always wanted to go to sea. The ocean has never been far away from our homes. I was at sea at the outbreak of World War 2 as a very young passenger on a ship named Bingera, travelling from Townsville to Brisbane. The owners of the Bingera were the Australian United Steam Navigation Co. with whom I commenced my Apprenticeship in 1952 aged 16.

Q. When did you become a Master Mariner?

I obtained my Certificate of Competency as a Master Mariner in 1960 at the tender age of 25. The examinations required about 3 months cramming at the Sydney Technical College at Ultimo, now the University of Technology.

Q. What did Margot do while you were scudding about the oceans?

I sent her off to work. We actually first met at a weekly dance night run by a group of ladies for the benefit of Officers from merchant ships in port. The dances were held in the Royal Blind Society's hall in William Street, Sydney. At that time, Margot was

working at the Mitchell Library, Macquarie Street Sydney. These days she operates the Large Print Library at the War Vets and I carry the books.

Q. What did you do after leaving the sea?

In 1963 I retired as a merchant ship's officer, having sailed as Third, Second and First Mate, to be Master of the Manly ferry "South Steyne". In the sixties, the Port Jackson & Manly Steamship Company operated an excursion trip on Sundays in summer to Broken Bay as far as Cottage Point and this required an ocean going master. Later I spent 2 years stevedoring and 19 years on shift work operating the port control tower where we co-ordinated and advised shipping in Sydney and Botany Bays. (This tower was nick-named the pill as it was said to control all the berths in Sydney). One of the highlights while working there was the 1988 Bi-centenary parade of ships - an unforgettable experience. Having had my fill of shift work, I downgraded to being a General Assistant at a high school, where I cut the grass and kept the grounds groomed and generally maintained the school.

Q. Why did you join Computer Pals?

When working at the port control tower, computers were in their infancy and one was sent up to the tower for us to learn what we could from it. All the instruction books were supplied, but we could not master the machine. Eventually I managed to get the machine working. It had no hard drive so you inserted a floppy disc to boot it up and another for word processing. Computers were being introduced to schools too and occasionally I became involved with setting them up. When I retired I joined FCPFS as a member to up-date my computer skills and quickly became a trainer.

Q. How do you get new trainers?

With great difficulty! It is the best way to learn computing. You most certainly do not need to be an expert to train and help others. We have been quite short of trainers, but fortunately, two new members recently decided to give it a go.

Q. What hobbies do you have besides Computer Pals?

Tennis 2 to 3 times per week. Three granddaughters, in their teens now, living at Shellharbour, where we visit frequently. Since moving to the "War Vets" Retirement Village, I've become involved in many activities, such as helping residents with their computing and other volunteer work where computer skills play a large part.

(Comment from Margot:- Darrell has been a trainer for 15 years and in that time he has gained as much from Computer Pals as any help he has provided. It has certainly provided an excellent interest for a retiree. Thanks Margot)

Thank you Darrell for all you do to help Computer Pals run so well. Ed.

MALWARE

Malware is an expression used to describe a host of hostile programs, which, if allowed entry to one's computer can cause a variety of problems for the computer owner. These problems may range from irritation, through theft of all your addresses, or identity and banking data, to a complete destruction of all your data and operating systems.

At every monthly meeting, president Colin implores members and guests to ensure they have good protection programs installed on their computers and that those programs are kept current. Despite his encouragement, Malware still invades some computers and indeed, new species of malware appear regularly, necessitating the analysis of the new malware by experts and the improvement of protection programs as soon as possible.

If you would like to understand more about Malware, there are several websites that are worth visiting. Merely Googling malware and entering the Wikipedia site will provide a good account of just what malware is.
